March 2nd – Jim McGinity Bird Banding and Florida Young Birders Club

On Saturday March 2nd we'll be joined by Jim McGinity, who'll be sharing two of his most important projects with us – the Florida Young Birders Club, and his work as a master bander. As a teacher, Jim has worked hard to foster a love of birds in young people, and is a founding member of the Florida Young Birders Club. He's going to tell us about its development, and will hopefully have one of them with him.

Last spring a group of us were able to join his banding station in Dunedin park to see him banding birds as they migrated through. We visited the mist nets, and watched him work carefully and quickly with each bird to add a band to its leg. Jim is often joined by young people, who are fascinated by the close-up look at birds.

And Jim's planning to finish up with a quiz, so there's a chance to test your bird ID skills too!

Chinsegut consists of hardwoods, sandhills, and freshwater wetlands and also contains a butterfly and native plant garden along with bird feeders. The tract is known for its Red-headed Woodpeckers, but also has numerous Eastern Towhees and Northern Bobwhite – species that are not so often seen by many of us. We are very fortunate to have Bev lead our walk as she knows this property really well and will give us a wonderful introduction to it.

Winter Shorebird Survey 2024 - Report

Every February, Pasco Audubon members help complete the Winter Shorebird Survey. Our biggest assignment is actually Fred Howard Park, where Pamela Graber, Lilian Saul, Peter Day, Alice Jewell and Christine Rowland conducted this year's survey. Highlights included a Piping Plover, Marbled Godwit, and 155 Black Skimmers (3 with bands). Christine also surveyed SunWest Park (highlights included 45 Dunlin and 36 Willets, Least and Western Sandpipers), Green Key (including 2 Black Skimmers – unusual for the Pasco coast these days) and Hudson Beach, where we had Semipalmated Sandpipers, Dunlin, and Ruddy Turnstone. Dan Larremore surveyed the Pasco portion of Anclote Key finding Snowy Plovers, Red Knot and Marbled Godwits!

March 23rd: Field Trip to Celery Fields

Celery Fields is a beautiful Audubon property that is well worth the drive. Audubon bird naturalists are stationed in gazebos over the wetland to help you identify the birds you are seeing. Want to see a Least Bittern? They'll help you with that. If you'd like to get a sense of what you might see, our list from last year's visit is at <u>https://ebird.org/checklist/S130685451</u> with lots of photos to give you a taste of what you might experience. Last year our list of birds included an American Bittern, Black-necked Stilts and Gray-headed Swamphen. In addition to the wetland, there is a gazebo with a feeder station beyond the welcome center on Palmer Blvd. There are also very active Purple Martin houses on either side of the parking lot.

We will meet at the boardwalk/gazebo off Raymond Rd. at 8am. Pull onto the verge for parking. Meeting in this location will allow early arrivals a great chance to see plenty while waiting for the rest of the group to arrive. If you confirm your plan to attend with me for this event I will send you a trail map of the property (president@pascoaudubon.com).

Report: Field Trip to Cross Bar Ranch, January 27th

Eighteen of us joined Dave Adams of Pinellas and Alex Reed of Quest Ecology to enjoy our annual visit to Cross Bar. With a little help from Alex we were able to spot a pair of Burrowing Owls peeking out of a newly excavated burrow. Another highlight came near the end of the trip when we stopped at a pond and were delighted to see a pair of Northern Pintail take off! With a total of 50 species for the morning our eBird list for the trip can be located at https://ebird.org/checklist/S159945597.





Lilian Saul led a group of 13 of us on a trip through Lake Dan Preserve. We found 63 species of birds (list is at <u>https://ebird.org/checklist/S161127908</u>). Some of the highlights included Roseate Spoonbills, Bald Eagles, Sedge Wren, Coopers Hawk and Orange-crowned Warbler. A non-birding highlight came on our way back, when we came across an orange tree with plenty of ripe fruit. It was a warm day, and the sweet oranges were delicious and much appreciated!





Field Trip to Gainesville – February 16-17

In the days before our trip began, it became evident that we were in for a wet weekend. Scrambling to salvage some birding from a difficult situation, 9 of us headed up to Gainesville a day early and were able to take advantage of some good weather to visit both Payne's Prairie's LaChua Trail and Sweetwater. We were able to get really great looks at Snail Kites on the LaChua Trail, had some local help to find Rusty Blackbirds at Sweetwater, then on Saturday we got distant views of the Whooping Crane from the Payne's Prairie observation tower (along with wild horses and bison), and finally we found a King Rail at Sweetwater to cap off our trip. Homeschool Students Learn about Birds in Starkey Park

Have you sometimes wondered how our grant-funded initiatives work in practice?

On February 15th a group of homeschool families from THINK Coop – 6 students and 3 moms – came to Jay B. Starkey Wilderness Park for an experience with birds. They prepared by borrowing our Audubon backpacks with binoculars for adults and children from the public library, and met me in the corral. We saw some Eastern Bluebirds and box #9 in the corral, then walked out to the bird blind (which we were able to fund with a lot of help from Duke Energy, and generous donations from our members).

From the bird blind we were able to see how little water was left as a result of prolonged drought (really only puddles are left). Still – we saw a Little Blue Heron, a Wilson's Snipe, a Blue-winged Teal (identified by an observant student using the illustrations on the sign inside the blind), Sandhill Cranes and many others. And the binoculars came in really handy! We noted that two of the threatened species listed on the signage were actually present at the time they were looking.

So thank you to all of you who have made this possible – the backpacks, the Bluebird boxes, the blind and the signage! Hopefully we have helped inspire some future birders. Photos shared with permission from the families.





It's time to put out your hummingbird feeders! Hummingbirds will start arriving this month, and will have lost half their body weight crossing the Gulf of Mexico. The nectar you provide will help them thrive!
